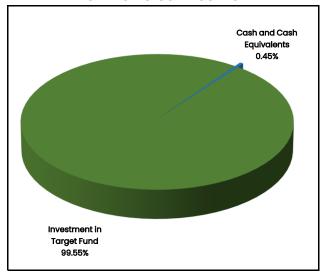

## COCOLIFE GLOBAL CONSUMER TRENDS INVESTMENT FUND

#### **Performance Drivers**

Equity markets reacted to uncertainty caused by US tariff policy and government upheaval, as well as concerns about overspending on artificial intelligence (AI).

The Target Fund had a negative absolute return and underperformed its benchmark, the MSCI World Consumer Discretionary Index, in March. Performance was in-line with peers.

On an absolute basis, interactive media & services (communication services), software & semiconductors (IT), hotels, restaurants & leisure, broadline retail & autos (consumer discretionary) were the largest detractors.

Relative to the benchmark, the following were detractors from performance: out-of-benchmark allocation in systems software, interactive media & services, semiconductors, application software, as well as stock selection in casino & gaming, apparel retail, and automobile manufacturers.

Relative contributors included out-of-benchmark allocation in interactive home entertainment and movies & entertainment.

#### Top absolute contributors

Sweetgreen: After a rough start to the year, Sweetgreen saw improved trends during March, as the weather improved, and the LA wildfires were contained. The Fund Manager continues to believe the key story here is automation, which will lead to throughput improvement. Restaurant traffic is very concentrated with lunch being 2-3 hours with a peak and a valley. Automation is geared to increase throughput rapidly.

IMAX: IMAX received analyst upgrades, as well as increased earnings estimates and price targets by third party research analysts during March.

Sea: The company reported impressive fourth quarter results, with revenues growing 37% year-over-year. Their eCommerce segment saw significant growth driven by Shopee. Their digital financial services segment saw 55% growth in revenues driven by SeaMoney. Several analysts raised their price target for the stock during the month.

### Top absolute detractors

Nebius and Meta: Both companies were hurt by concerns related to the AI theme. First, the Chinese AI model DeepSeek (not a Target Fund holding) appeared to show strong results with far fewer chip sets than other models. Second, Microsoft (also a Target Fund holding) appears to have gone through three rounds of data center lease cancellations. The Fund Manager believes many of these cancellations were driven by a change in its partnership with OpenAI (not a Target Fund holding) and that Microsoft's commitment to AI remains strong. However, these events combined caused concerns of overspending and an overhang on most Al-related stocks.

DraftKings: Sports outcomes for the first two weekends of the NCAA tournament were unfavorable. Further, New Jersey is likely to increase their tax rate, which may impact earnings after mitigation efforts. And Texas will no longer let DraftKing's Jack Pocket business sell lottery tickets. The Fund Manager continues to like the stock despite these events.

Amazon.com: The stock lagged following fourth quarter results that were solid but noted cloud capacity constraints. Also, the outlook for 2025 capital expenditures was much higher than expected. Early concerns about how tariffs would affect retail prices for discretionary items weighed on the stock.

Tesla: The company reported weak deliveries in the US and Europe. There is concern that Elon Musk's political activities have damaged the brand and destroyed demand. This view has some merit, but the company was also refreshing its popular Model Y crossover. Ultimately, the Target Fund owns the stock for the autonomous driving robotaxi and robots to come.

### Outlook

Recent investor uncertainty related to tariffs, DOGE (Department of Government Efficiency) U.S. federal spending cuts, and the Trump administration policy has driven a pause and re-rating of the market.

Prior to Liberation Day, the Fund Manager had taken steps to reduce tariff exposure within the portfolio, reducing cyclical and/or smaller cap companies, or those with high levels of imported goods. However, they have maintained a growth tilt and have not rotated into a defensive position at this time.

The Fund Manager remains vigilant in closely monitoring the data so that they can swiftly adapt to changes in the economic landscape.

From a fundamental standpoint, the Fund Manager believes most of their holdings are well positioned to deliver good results through these headwinds but also expect a muted earnings season as many companies will be more conservative with their outlooks given market volatility.

The Fund Manager remains confident in their long-term secular themes and view the current market conditions as an opportunity to invest in high-quality, long-term growth stocks at more attractive prices.

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
